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Chapter 1 Introduction

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1.1 Overview

This guide provides instructions for operating and maintaining the CenovaTM Image Analytics Server in the clinical environment. The server processes mammography images using proprietary software algorithms.

The Cenova server is a high-performance application server that provides proprietary software applications to assist radiologists in the analysis of digital mammography images. Cenova server is designed to be used by radiologists working in a hospital, outpatient clinic, or a breast imaging center. The server also may be used for research-related activities.

The server can be located in any non-patient environment, provided it is connected to the mammography network. Once configured, little direct interaction with the server is necessary. Any interaction is through a user-friendly web browser interface.

DICOM Conventions

DICOM (Digital Imaging and Communications in Medicine) is an international standard used for developing, transmitting, printing, and archiving medical imaging information. Hologic uses the following DICOM standard designations for digital mammography images:

- DICOM Digital Mammography X-Ray Image For Processing
- DICOM Digital Mammography X-Ray Image For Presentation
- DICOM Secondary Capture Image Raw Projection
- DICOM Secondary Capture Image Raw Synthesized 2D

To simplify, this guide shortens these designations to 'For Processing images', 'For Presentation images', 'Raw Projection images', and 'Raw Synthesized 2D images.'

- The server is intended for use only by personnel who have read this guide and received training on how to use the server. Hologic does not accept responsibility for injury or damage associated with improper or unsafe system operation.
- Use the server only outside the patient environment. The server is rated for use only in an office environment.
- Do not place liquid containers on the device. In the event of a spill, shut down power to all components prior to cleaning to minimize the possibility of electrical shock. If internal components are exposed to liquid, do not operate the device contact your service representative.



Caution:

Always shut down the computer according to the procedures provided in this guide. Improper system shutdown can cause loss of data or damage to the computer operating system.

1.4.2 Installation and Maintenance

2.1.1 Input Devices

The server supports inputs from the types of devices listed below. Certain in-country restrictions may apply.

- Full Field Digital Mammography Systems: Cenova processes two-dimensional digital mammography images originating from Full-Field Digital Mammography (FFDM) image acquisition systems. Cenova supports inputs from FFDM devices manufactured by Hologic Inc. (Danbury, CT), GE Healthcare (Waukesha, WI), and Siemens AG (Munich, Germany).
- Digital Breast Tomosynthesis Systems: Cenova processes 3D MammographyTM
 datasets and synthesized 2D images originating from Hologic Selenia[®] Dimensions[®]
 systems.
- Film Digitizing Systems: For film mammograms, Cenova processes DigitalNowTM images originating from any Hologic film-scanning systems.

In addition, images produced by any of these systems may be sent to Cenova from a Picture Archiving and Communication System (PACS).

For more information about supported input devices, see the document for the specific software application.

2.1.2 Image Formats

The Cenova server processes digital mammography image objects that conform to the DICOM standard. The server processes the following types of DICOM image objects:

- Image objects sent to Cenova by an FFDM system following a conventional mammography examination known as For Processing images (also referred to as 'raw' 2D images).
- Image objects sent to Cenova by Hologic 3D MammographyTM systems known as *Raw Projection* images.

- Image objects sent to Cenova by Hologic 3D MammographyTM systems known as *Raw Synthesized 2D* images.
- Image objects sent to Cenova by any of the Hologic film-digitizing systems known as *For Presentation* images.

Some DICOM image objects are not processed by the software, depending upon the application and mammography view shown in the image.

For more information on image formats, see the diagrams in <u>Data Flows</u> on page 12.

2.1.3 Input Ports and Application Licenses

Each device that produces digital mammography image files maps to an input port on the Cenova server. The DICOM header for each image object includes an identifier (e.g., a serial number) that indicates the device from which the image originated.

For each Cenova server, sites can support:

- Up to four licenses for any or all of the 2D software applications plus a single license for DigitalNow HD, or
- A single license for DigitalNow HD

Note that exceeding these guidelines with a single server can affect system response times.

Each Cenova software application requires one software license for each input device. For example, if there are four FFDM devices, then the Cenova server must be configured with four software licenses for each desired Cenova software application.

The Cenova server can also process images sent from any number of PACS devices, as long as the images originated from one of the licensed input devices.

For assistance with license configurations, contact your Hologic Account Manager.

2.2 Results from Cenova

Cenova sends its results to diagnostic review workstations (such as Hologic SecurView DX) and PACS devices. Depending upon the application, Cenova can transmit results in one or more forms. The table below shows output formats for each application.

- CAD SR The Mammography CAD SR format is the DICOM standard used for ImageChecker CAD and/or Hologic Imaging Biomarker results.
- SC Image Mammography CAD SC (Secondary Capture) provides the caseprocessed views (normally the four screening views) with ImageChecker CAD, or Hologic Imaging Biomarkers. For ImageChecker CAD and Hologic Imaging Biomarkers, this format is for workstations that do not support Mammography CAD SR.
- RTSS The Radiotherapy Structure Set format was developed specifically to display ImageChecker CAD results on certain GE review workstations.
- **Printer** This format provides ImageChecker CAD results for the case-processed views (normally the four screening views).
- MG Image This format (DICOM Digital Mammography X-Ray Image For Presentation) provides DigitalNow HD images.

For workstations and PACS devices that do not support ImageChecker CAD Mammography CAD SR objects but do support DICOM 6000 overlays, the Hologic DICOM 6000 Interface solution can be used to convert the ImageChecker CAD results (see ImageChecker CAD with DICOM 6000 Data Flow on page 15). Note

DICOM 6000 version 1.1.7 is required to support CAD on synthesized 2D image results as DICOM 6000 overlay.



Note

DICOM 6000 Interface version 1.1.7 may reside on a Cenova server.

Note that mammography systems may have different configurations, depending upon the devices installed at your site.

2.3.1 ImageChecker CAD Data Flow

The diagram below shows how information typically flows through systems with ImageChecker CAD.



Note

ImageChecker CAD also applies to synthesized 2D images. Raw synthesized 2D images are sent to the Cenova server. Corresponding Breast Tomosynthesis Image or For Presentation images are sent to the diagnostic review workstation(s) and PACS.



Note

When both conventional 2D mammography and synthesized 2D images are sent to Cenova for a ComboHD study, the Cenova server will produce separate ImageChecker CAD results for the conventional 2D mammography and synthesized 2D images, respectively.


Image Acquisition System(s)

1, 2, 3: FFDM systems can be configured to send digital mammography x-ray images to any device that conforms to the DICOM standard. The FFDM device sends two types of images, For Processing images to the Cenova server, and For Presentation images to the diagnostic review workstation(s) and PACS.

Cenova Server

4, 5, 6: The Cenova server sends results (for example, Mammography CAD SR objects or CAD SC images) to one or more diagnostic review workstation(s) and/or PACS devices. The Cenova server can also provide printed results showing the four case-processed views with CAD marks.

- **3, 4, 8:** The review workstation(s) are configured to receive the For Presentation images (3, 8) and ImageChecker CAD results (4, 8), which are then reviewed by the radiologist.
- 7, 8: The PACS can be configured to send:
- For Processing images to Cenova (7), which processes the images and distributes the CAD results according to its configuration, and/or
- ImageChecker CAD results and/or For Presentation images to the review workstations (8).

2.3.2 ImageChecker CAD with DICOM 6000 Data Flow

Typically, diagnostic review workstations and PACS devices support the Mammography CAD SR results format. If the review workstation or PACS does not support Mammography CAD SR, but does support DICOM 6000 overlays, a supplementary interface solution can be installed. For more information about the Hologic DICOM 6000 interface option, contact your Hologic Account Manager.

Image Acquisition System(s)

1, 2, 3, 4: The FFDM device sends For Processing images to the Cenova server, and For Presentation images to the diagnostic review workstation(s), PACS, and DICOM 6000 Interface.

Cenova Server

5: The Cenova server sends CAD results in DICOM Mammography CAD SR format to the DICOM 6000 Interface. No images need be forwarded.

DICOM 6000 Interface


6: The DICOM 6000 Interface sends the images with DICOM 6000 CAD results overlays to the diagnostic workstation for review and to the PACS for storage.



Note

The DICOM 6000 Interface may reside on a Cenova server.

- **3, 6:** The review workstation receives the For Presentation images and the For Presentation images with DICOM 6000 CAD results overlays, which then can be reviewed by the radiologist.
- 7: If results are stored on a PACS, then they can be retrieved and sent to the review workstation at any time.

2.3.3 Hologic Imaging Biomarkers Data Flow

The figure below shows the data flows among the various devices for the Quantra application.



Note

When both conventional 2D mammography and Raw Projection images are sent to Cenova for a Combo or ComboHD study, the Cenova server will produce one set of Quantra results for either the 2D or 3D images, per Cenova configuration.

Image Acquisition Device(s)

1, 2, 3: The Hologic FFDM device sends For Processing images to the Cenova server, and For Presentation images to the diagnostic review workstation(s) and PACS. The Hologic 3D MammographyTM device sends Raw Projection images to the Cenova server, and Reconstructed Slices to the diagnostic review workstation(s) and PACS.

Cenova Server


4, 5: The Cenova server sends Hologic Imaging Biomarker results (DICOM SR objects or DICOM SC images) to one or more diagnostic review workstation(s) and/or PACS devices simultaneously.



Note

The Hologic SecurView DX workstation, some non-Hologic workstations, and several reporting applications will display Biomarker results content from DICOM Mammography CAD SR. For applications that are not capable of interpreting and displaying the SR content, or for customers who prefer a more user-friendly Biomarker results output, the Cenova server can be configured instead to send Biomarker results as a DICOM Secondary Capture Image.

- **1, 4, 7:** The review workstation(s) are configured to receive the For Presentation images, Reconstructed Slices, and Biomarker results, which are then reviewed by the radiologist.
- **6, 7:** As an option, the PACS can be configured to send:
- For Processing images to Cenova (6), which processes the images and distributes the Biomarker results according to its configuration, and/or
- Biomarker results and/or For Presentation images to the review workstations (7).



2.3.4 DigitalNow HD Data Flow

The figure below shows the data flows among the various devices.


Source Image Device

1: The Hologic film scanning system sends DigitalNow For Presentation images to the Cenova server.

Cenova Server

- **2:** The Cenova server processes the images and sends new DigitalNow HD For Presentation images to a PACS device.
- **3:** As an option, the server can also send the images directly to one or more diagnostic review workstation(s).

- **4:** The PACS is configured to send the For Presentation DigitalNow HD images to one or more review workstation(s). The radiologist can then review the images.
- **5:** Depending upon the needs of the site, the PACS can also be configured to send previously archived DigitalNow images to the Cenova server.

Once configured, little direct interaction with the Cenova server is necessary. Any interaction with the server is through a web browser and a user-friendly interface.

3.1 Clinical Workflow

To view results produced by the Cenova server with the patient's mammography images, follow the guidelines of your workstation vendor. Radiologists typically review mammography images using a protocol similar to the sequence shown in the following table:

For this step	The radiologist
Preliminary Review	Reviews the mammography images to get a preliminary sense of the patient's status.
DigitalNow HD	Compares prior digitized film images to the new mammography images.
Hologic Imaging Biomarkers	Reviews and notes the Biomarker findings.
Preliminary Assessment	Examines the mammography images in detail and forms a primary diagnosis.
Computer Aided Detection	Views CAD marks and evaluates related ImageChecker data to determine if other areas on the images warrant further review.
Final Assessment	Makes a final assessment and creates a report.


3.2 Sending Images to the Server

The server accepts the images automatically as they are sent from the image acquisition system, film-scanner, or archiving device. The Cenova server groups successive images with the same DICOM study instance UID (unique identifier) into a case if the images are received within a time-out period configured by the service representative upon system installation. The time-out period is not fixed; the server automatically adjusts the time-out period to maximize throughput. (For more information, contact Hologic Technical Support.)



Server Assigns Images Received Before Timeout Elapses to One Case

The server assigns any image received after the time-out period to a new case using the same study instance UID. At the review workstation, two sets of results will be seen, distinguishable by the date and time they were produced by the server.



Server Assigns Images Received After Timeout Elapses to a New Case

To reduce the possibility of multiple results, Hologic recommends that images for each patient examination be sent from the image acquisition system together at the close of the study and in rapid succession.



Note

As an alternative, the server can be configured to group all images with the same study instance UID automatically into a single case, no matter when they were received (i.e., include images from a previous case). For more information, consult with a technical support representative.

It is the service representative's responsibility to set up your system such that the images are sent correctly to the server in addition to the review workstation and to the desired final destinations. For more about the data flow among the various devices, see <u>Data Flows</u> on page 12.

3.3 Server Startup and Shutdown

The Cenova server does not require regular maintenance. The only procedures you might need to perform are:

- Shutting Down the Server on page 23
- Starting Up the Server on page 24
- Restarting the Server on page 24 (turning off and on again)

For these procedures, you need to know the IP address for the computer. You can get the IP address from the Cenova System Settings – Connectivity screen. Write that number here:

Note

Use these procedures when DICOM 6000 Interface is installed on a Cenova server.

3.3.1 Shutting Down the Server

You might need to shut down the Cenova server if you are going to move the computer, or if you know the power is going out for a period of time.




Important

If you shut down the server from a remote location, be aware that in order to switch the server back on, you will need to have physical access to the server.

To shut down the server:

- 1. Using a computer that is on the same network as the server, open a web browser (for example, Internet Explorer).
- 2. Type the IP address for the server in the address box and press [Enter]. You do not need to type 'http' or anything other than the IP address.
- 3. At the log-in screen, enter the user name (siteadmin) and password. The About screen should appear as shown below.



4. Click **System Control** to display the following screen:



5. Click **Shutdown**. The server prompts 'Are you sure...?' Click **OK** to switch the server off.



Note

Physical access to the server is required to restore power from a shutdown. If the server is in a remote location, use **Restart**.

3.3.2 Starting Up the Server

If the server has been powered off, you can switch it back on by pressing the power switch on the front of the computer. (An indicator light indicates whether the server is on or off.) The Cenova software starts up automatically, and the server should be ready for use within 3–5 minutes.

3.3.3 Restarting the Server

You might need to restart the Cenova server if results are not transferring. Often, restarting the server clears any errors. In some cases, your service representative will ask you to restart the server.

`To restart the server:

- 1. Using a computer that is on the same network as the Cenova server, open a web browser.
- 2. Type the IP address for the Cenova server in the address box and press [Enter]. You do not need to type 'http' or anything other than the IP address.
- 3. At the log-in screen, enter the user name ('Administrator') and password. The About screen should appear as shown in the previous procedure.
- 4. On the About screen, click **System Control**.
- 5. From the System Control screen, click **Restart**. The server prompts 'Are you sure...?' Click the Restart button once more. The server should shut down and then restart automatically. The server should be ready for use within about 5 minutes.



Note

To continue using the server, refresh the browser by repeating steps 1–3.

3.4 Accessing Unique Device Identifier (UDI) Information

Unique Device Identifier (UDI) is a unique numeric or alphanumeric code that identifies a medical device through distribution and use. UDI information is displayed in the About screen of the Cenova application.

To access UDI information in Cenova:


- 1. Launch the Cenova application and log in (see <u>Server Startup and Shutdown</u> on page 22). The About screen appears.
- On the About screen, click More Information.
 UDI information is displayed on the subsequent screen.

3.5 Using Case Manager

Case Manager allows you to display, analyze, and troubleshoot cases from within the Cenova Control Panel. You can use Case Manager to:

- Browse and sort cases
- Search for a study using data such as patient information, date processed, etc.
- Export Biomarker results
- Delete cases
- · Review details for a study

When you select the Case Manager option from the Cenova control panel, a screen similar to the following appears:



By default, the cases appear in reverse chronological order (newest first). The records are arranged in rows and columns. Each row shows one case.

Click **Hide Navigation Panel** (



) to expand the Case Manager viewing window.

To browse and sort cases


You can sort the values in any column by clicking any of the column headings (Patient Name, Patient ID, etc.). The server sorts the values in ascending order either alphanumerically or by date and time, depending upon the type of data to be sorted. Click the column heading again to sort in descending order.




To search for a study

In any of the column heading boxes, enter text or numbers you want to find and press [Enter]. The server searches its database and returns only studies with values containing the characters you typed.

To remove the filter, click **Filter** ($^{\mathsf{Y}}$) and click **NoFilter** in the drop-down list:



For some columns, you can exclude a search criterion by using the 'Not' box



To clear selected search criteria, click Clear Filters.

To export Biomarker results



Warning:

The Export Biomarkers feature provides values that are for research purposes only. This feature is not intended for clinical use.

You can collect Biomarker results and export the results to a .csv file, which can be opened using a spreadsheet application. To use this feature, the server must be configured with a valid Hologic Imaging Biomarkers license.

- 1. Select one or more cases using the Case Manager search function. If you do not select any cases, then the server will export all Biomarker results.
- 2. Click **Export Biomarkers** to display the File Download window.
- 3. Click **Save**. In the Save As window, navigate to the location where you wish to save the file and click **Save**.

To delete cases

Display the case you want to delete and click the check box next to the case:



Then, click Delete.

To review details for a study

Click

to expand the case and review the Images and Output Jobs details:



Click to view additional details for each image.



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
